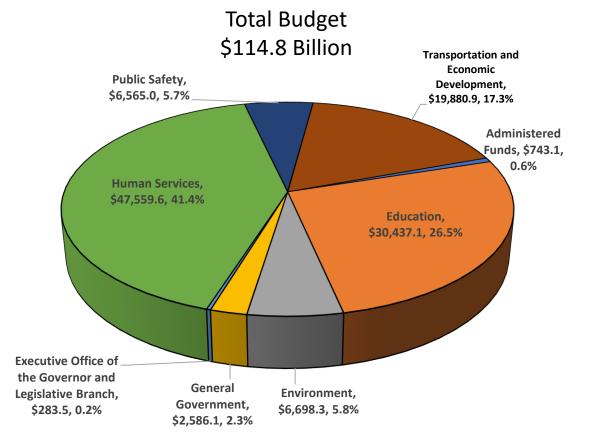

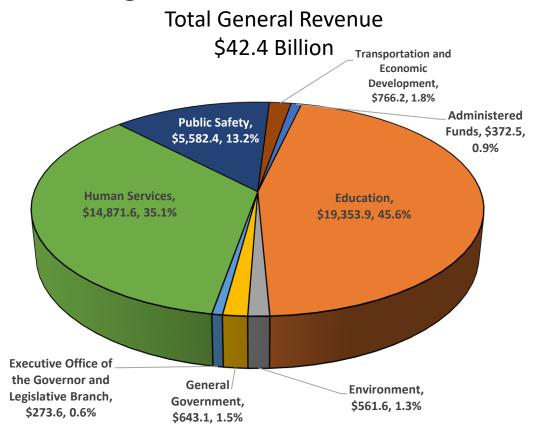
FY 2023-24 Budget - \$42.4 Billion General Revenue

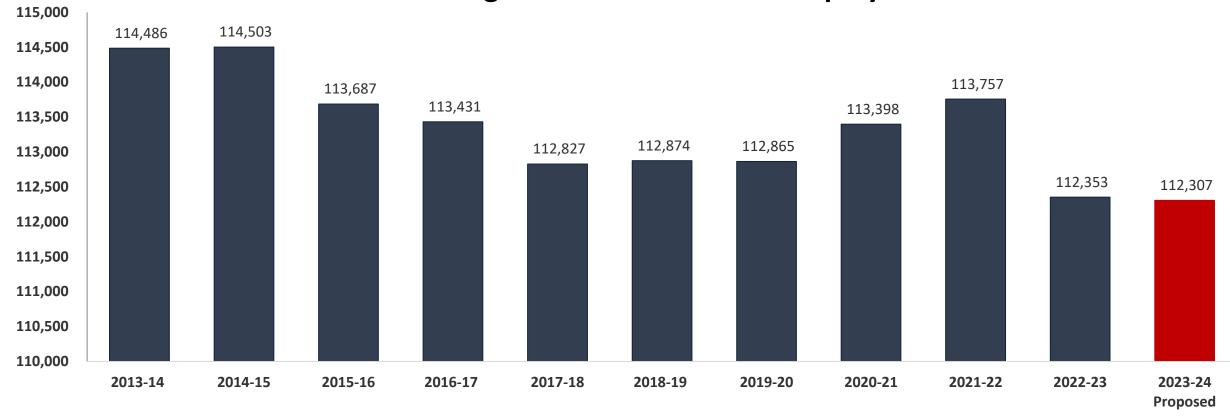




- Health and Human Services represents the largest portion of the total budget
 - Education represents the largest portion of the General Revenue budget

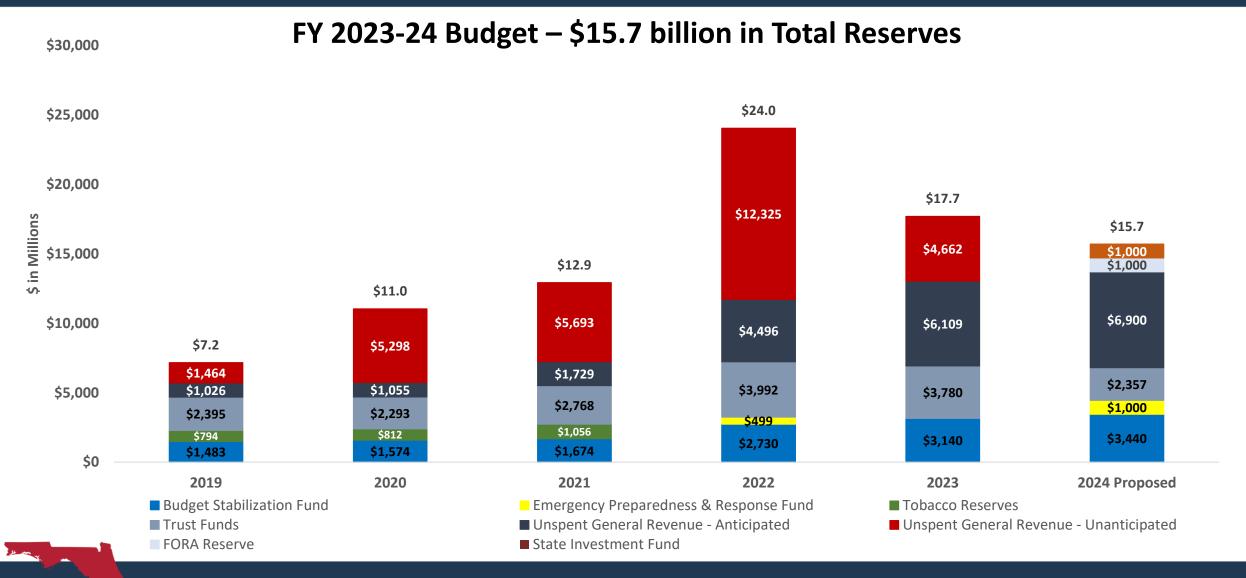

The Framework for Freedom Budget recommends a net decrease of <u>46 FTE</u> based on a realignment of priorities across state agencies, reducing excess vacant positions to accommodate new positions for critical programs and services.

State Investment Fund and Debt Reduction Program

- \$1 billon from General Revenue dedicated to a new State Investment Fund
 - Fund is last resort for reserves, behind BSF
 - First \$100 million of General Revenue investment earnings annually transferred to Fund beginning in FY 2024-25
 - First 3% of investment earnings are retained in the Fund
 - Earnings in excess of 3% and up to 5.5% available to the Division of Bond Finance for the Debt Reduction Program
 - Earnings in excess of 5.5% will be available to be returned to the General Revenue Fund
- \$400 million provided for the new Debt Reduction Program
 - Administered by the Division of Bond Finance for the purpose of retiring outstanding state debt prior to its maturity and generating savings by avoiding interest costs

FY 2023-24 Budget – Pay Package Methodology

- **Step 1**: Calculated a 5% pay increase for filled and vacant employees in the State Personnel System, effective July 1, 2023.
- **Step 2**: After the 5% pay increase was applied, calculated an average 10% pay increase for "hard-to-fill" positions in the areas of Accounting, Budget, Finance, Auditing, Legal, Information Technology, Laboratory Technology and Nursing, effective October 1, 2023.
- **Step 3**: After the 5% pay increase was applied, calculated pay increases for the Department of Corrections, effective July 1, 2023, increasing to \$23/Hour, funding Retention Plan based on years of service, increase for Vocational Teachers, and a CAD.
- **Step 4**: After the 5% pay increase was applied, calculated Law Enforcement Officers pay increases, effective July 1, 2023, increasing to \$55,000 minimum salary, percentage increase based on salary range, and increase for years of service. A 4% increase was applied after the above pay increases for FDLE Special Agents and LEO, effective July 1, 2023.



FY 2023-24 Budget – Pay Package Methodology

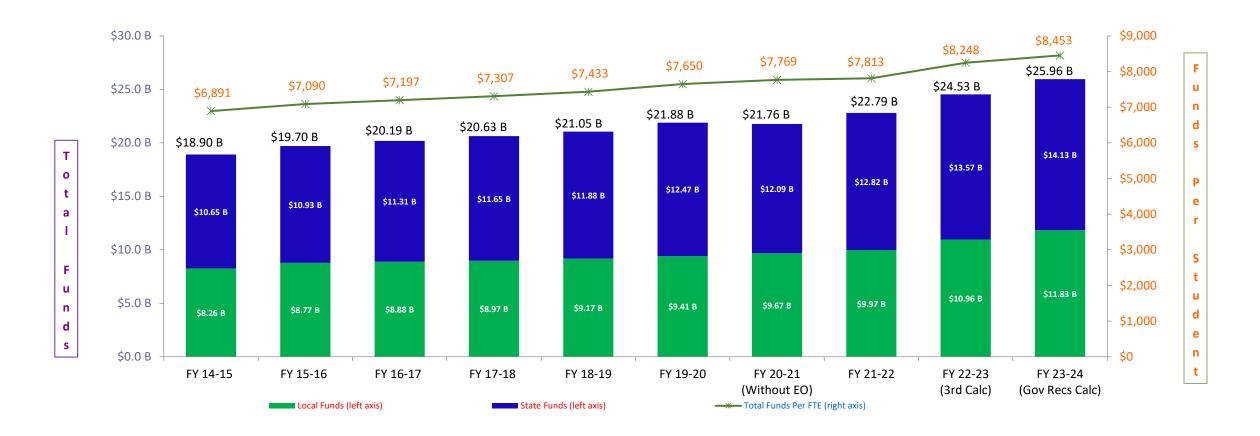
- **Step 5**: Calculated Other State Agency pay increases off the adjusted base established in Step 1, for an effective date of July 1, 2023.
 - 3% pay increase for State Attorneys and Step Plan increase for Assistant State Attorneys
 - DCF Child Protective Investigators and Economic Self-Sufficiency positions
 - DBPR Regulatory Specialist recruitment and retention
 - Increase the minimum base rate to \$172,000 for Administrative Law Judges, Judges of Compensation Claims and the Director of Administration
